NYU Lutheran Family Health Centers Overview of Services

- Established in 1883, NYU Lutheran is a safety-net hospital and primary healthcare provider serving diverse communities in Southwest Brooklyn and the 5 Boroughs
- Formed Sunset Park Health Council, Inc. One of the nation's largest & longest standing FQHC's with 10 community health centers, 27 school-based health centers, community medicine program (homeless population), and community-based programs
- Current NYU LFHC governing board remains over 75% community residents
- NYU Lutheran FHC defines health as inclusive of economic, social and education well-being thereby influencing the opportunity to make healthy choices
- Stable housing is integral to improving health outcomes and lowering costs for high-needs, high cost Medicaid/Medicare members





NYU Lutheran Family Health Centers Addressing Social Determinants of Health

Affordable Housing is Critical to NYC's Large Population of Foreign-Born Older Adults

- New York has the largest foreign-born senior population of any U.S. City (46% of total senior population)
- Sunset Park, Brooklyn has the largest percentage of immigrant seniors living below poverty line compared with all other NYC neighborhoods (47% of seniors are poor vs. the citywide average of 24%)
- Median income for immigrant seniors in New York is \$9,900 as compared to the native-born senior median income of \$18,300

- Lack of good quality affordable housing, forces seniors to move out of familiar communities in order to find the cheapest rents or remain in rentcontrolled apartments that are no longer suitable for them.
- Many foreign-born seniors are ineligible for Medicare because they lack the required 40 credit work period.





NYU Lutheran Family Health Centers Addressing Social Determinants of Health

- High Poverty and Poor Housing Options Results in Lack of Opportunity to Age In Place
- In 1977, NYU Lutheran sponsored and built three rent subsidized senior citizen apartment complexes serving the residents of Bay Ridge and Sunset Park, Brooklyn
- 725 additional rent subsidized units for seniors with healthcare, rehabilitation and a continuum of social services co-located in the buildings
- On-site services for older adults help housing residents stay healthy and active as they age
 - Neighborhood Centers for Older Adults
 - Social Model Day Programming
 - Service Coordination
 - Caregiver Support
 - Transportation
 - Health and Wellness Programming

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Participant Story: Housing and Support Services Improve Health Outcomes

- *Ms.* V is 86 years old. She came to the U.S. in 1989 from the Soviet Union.
- Forced to live in cheap inaccessible housing, she became isolated her from social life and proper medical care. Ms. V's diabetes worsened and her mobility became impaired.
- In 1993, Ms. V became one of the first residents of NYU Lutheran's Harbor Hill Senior Housing Center. The Russian-speaking Service Coordinator at Harbor Hill helped her obtain Medicaid, food stamps, transportation, and an adult day center where Russian was spoken.
- *Ms.* V also began receiving all medical care at NYU Lutheran's main campus. *Ms.* V's health improved so much she was able to take a trip back to Ukraine to see family.





Bay Ridge on the Move Transportation Service is one of many supportive services that help Ms. V stay healthy and active as she ages.
